Dear Chairman Forbes,

This letter is in response to case number 261-39-GR-20-ZBA Appeal pursuant to RSA 674:34. I am opposed to the issuance of any building permits by the Town of Barrington on the island in Mendoms Pond, map 261 lot 39, owned by Richard Kelsey and Mary Otiato. I am opposed to the Barrington ZBA overturning John Huckins denial of a building permit or providing any relief that might allow construction on the island. The island has no road frontage as required by RSA 674:41. I request this document be included in the minutes of this hearing.

No zoning ordinance may waive the frontage requirements in the statute... However, there is one loophole in this area. Under RSA 674:41,II-a, the legislative body may vote to except any lot, including island lots for islands served exclusively by boats, from the frontage requirements of the statute.

RA 674:41 prohibits the issuance of building permits.

And attorneys Dietz and Kennedy — as well as New York attorney Brooks Banker, have been arguing the Supreme Court has interpreted that statute to mean that no building permit can be issued for any lot in New Hampshire that is not served by a proper street. *From Laconia Daily Sun 11-17-2005* 

RSA 674:41 II-a provides the only allowable exception for islands served exclusively by boats from the law, which requires an affirmative vote by the legislative body. The Town of Barrington has not voted to allow construction on islands.

I submit the following case in Meredith that affirms the issuance of building permits on islands requires an affirmative vote by the legislative body.

To summarize the case which lasted over several years:

Henmore, the developer, obtained a subdivision approval and building permits for two seasonal homes on Bryant Island.

Shoreline owners appealed and prevailed in court and the court overturned all previous approvals and permits.

Starting over:

The ZBA granted a variance to road frontage.

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The PB granted approval with many conditions and submitted the statutorily required zoning amendment to the voters.

The statutorily required zoning amendment was voted down at town meeting in March 2008.

To date no seasonal homes were built on the Island because Meredith legislative body did not approve this allowance.

Late last month, Justice Larry M. Smukler ruled... that town building inspector Bill Edney should not have issued the company a building permit. *Laconia Daily Sun* 2-11-2007

In rescinding the building permit, Smukler said the developer should have appealed to the zoning for an exception to the road frontage rule. *blewiscitizen.com* 1-30-2007

"Henmore did not seek any such exception and because the town has not legislatively created an exception from island lots from the street requirements, the building inspector's conditional approval of Henmore's building permit application was erroneous," Judge Smukler ruled. Text of the amendment No. 1 (Proposed by the Planning Board) To except Island Lots from RSA 674:41

Amend Article III, General Provisions, by inserting the following new paragraph: W. Certain Island Lots Excepted from RSA 674:41

Pursuant to RSA 674:41, II-a, all lots on islands served exclusively by boats are hereby excepted from the requirements of 674:41, I and II as the same may be amended from time to time.

§ 175-42.1 Building permit requirement for island lots.

[Added 3-13-2012 ATM by Art. 2]

In accordance with RSA 674:41, II-a, island lots for islands served exclusively by boats are exempt from the compliance with RSA 674:41.

I am also providing the below information to the Barrington ZBA, as I believe the information previously provided to the ZBA conflicts with the facts, specifically the existence of a wood stove and gas cook stove in the Mendoms Island house.

Once in a life opportunity to own 2 PRIVATE ISLANDS situated on Mendums Pond. Island #1: Seasonal Fieldstone cabin on the 1.4 acre island, a stone fireplace, wood stove, gas cook stove, enclosed porch. Nice outdoor privy, dug well with pitcher hand pump. Outdoor fireplace, 50 foot dock. Island #2: 4.1 acres with tent platform, nice coves and beaches, just 120 feet from island #1. Both islands are heavily wooded, and truly pristine and private! Pond is airplane accessible. Island access is currently written permission by the state of NH DES across state owned right of way, gated and private for island owner's use only. Mendums Pond is 265 acres, and averages 25 to 45 feet deep.

I also believe John Huckins mislead the ZBA by declaring that a "camp" is permitted by RSA 674:41. Huckins cites A Hard Road to Travel (p116-119) to justify construction on islands. The document text he cites provides an example of construction on a lot whose only frontage is a private roadway not shown on any plan approved by the planning board. The text states that although the ZBA might possibly find all the four exception standards be met for an agricultural shed or a primitive hunting camp, they may virtually never be met for a year-round house. This example is about the distinction between unapproved private roads and public roads and does not pertain to lots with no street frontage or island construction permits.

The entire document, "A Hard Road to Travel" does not include any reference to islands or analysis of how the law RSA 674:41 applies to islands. The document does explain how "grandfathering" does not provide an exemption to the law. The law applies to all building permits and does not exclude seasonal dwellings.

The owner, Richard Kelsey, did acknowledge he had no deeded access to the islands.

The Supreme Court has observed that "[t]he evident purpose of [the frontage] requirement is to insure that a dwelling may be reached by the fire department, police department, and other agencies charged with the responsibility of protecting the public peace, safety and welfare." *Sanderson v. Candia*, 146 N.H. 598, 600 (2001).

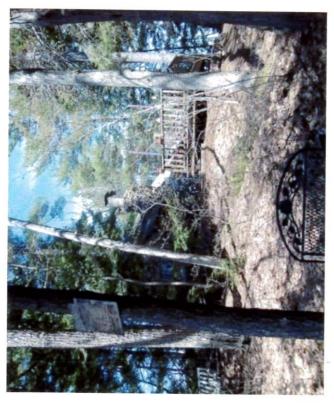
