2. Public Hearings

- a. Issuance of building permit at on Crossley Road, a Private Road, for Kasey Landry Filion and Scott Filion, Map 106 Lot 15 Vote

 - 7. Clear brush back on both sides of Crossley Road from Washington Street to the driveway.
 - 8. Keep the mouth of the driveway wide enough for a truck to turn around.
 - iii. The Select Board is asked to consider authorizing the issuance of a building permit for Map 106, Lot 15 with the condition indicated above.

b. Acceptance of Center for Tech and Civic Life Grant – Vote

- i. The Center for Tech and Civic Life ("CTCL"), a nonprofit organization taxexempt under Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") section 501(c)(3), has decided to award a grant of \$5,000 to support the work of the Town of Barrington elections.
- ii. The grant funds must be used exclusively for the public purpose of planning and operationalizing safe and secure election administration in Barrington in 2020.

The grant funds can be used for personal protective equipment (PPE) for staff, poll workers, or voters, poll worker recruitment funds, hazard pay, and/or training expenses, polling place rental and cleaning expenses for early voting or Election Day, temporary staffing, and absentee voting equipment or supplies. Grantee may allocate grant funds among those needs, or to other public purposes listed in the grant application, without further notice to or permission of CTCL.

 - a. 2021 Road Improvement Projects Discussion
 - i. At the October 5, 2020 meeting, the Road Agent presented the Select Board with preliminary recommendations for <u>road paving</u> and <u>road construction</u> projects. The Select Board approved the road paving projects but has requested additional consideration for two road construction projects.



ii. Orchard Hill Improvements

- 1. During late 2017 and much of 2018, Mr. Connick worked with the Select Board, Planning Board, and Zoning Board to reestablish the road Right-of-Way in order for the Town to make drainage and safety improvements to Orchard Hill Road. Below, please find a chronological listing of Board actions and information.

- 2. The Road Agent agrees with the estimate previously provided that the proposed work would cost approximately \$166,000.
- 3. The Select Board is asked to consider how to proceed with improvements to Orchard Hill Roads

iii. Lakeside Oaks Drive Culverts – Discussion

- 1. The Select Board requested that feasibility research be conducted regarding the permanent removal of the Lakeside Oaks Drive culverts and connection of Pearl Lane and Peabody Way.
- 2. In consultation with the Town's attorney, she explained that even if there is a tangential public benefit, RSA 231:59 would prohibit the construction of the new private road necessary to connect the ends of Pearl Lane and Peabody Way.
- 3. The Select Board is asked to consider how to proceed with the culvert improvements necessary for the proper operation of Swains Lake Dam.

b. Highway Garage Office Improvements – Discussion

i. Staff are still evaluating the feasibility and costs of securing a permanent/semi-permanent trailer for the Highway facility. The remedial action taken following the 9/28 Select Board meeting has afforded the Select Board and Highway Department time in order to properly evaluate what is in the best interest of the Town.



- c. Map 126, Lot 18 Purchase Price Reduction Request Vote
 - i. The Select Board previously supported the Town Lands Committee's recommendation to sell Map 126, Lot 18 directly to an abutter. The Town offered the property for sale to each abutter and two abutters responded indicating their interest in purchasing the property for the full amount owed (\$31,540). After learning that their neighbor was also interested, the two abutters agreed that one would purchase the lot and they would divide the property among both lots after the fact. The Town Lands Committee supported this approach.
 - ii. Specifically, The Reilly family and the Mitropoulos family expressed their interest in the lot. The Reilly's withdrew their offer with the intent that the Mitropoulos family would purchase the property. The Mitropoulos family is now requesting that they Select Board consider reducing the price, see below from October 5, 2020:
 - 1. As you may know, The Reilly's have withdrawn their bid on the River Rd lot (tax map 126-0018) so that we may move forward with the purchase. I know that I have committed to the purchase price of \$31,540 but was wondering if the Board would consider working with me on this price. It is our goal to protect this parcel from development and am planning to split it with an abutter. We've had discussions with Berry Surveying and for us to have the three lots surveyed to do the lot line adjustments, it's going to cost \$7,000-\$8,000, and that is in addition to filing fees and state taxes. Please let me know if this is something that can be discussed and if not, please tell me what my next step is for the purchase. Thank you for consideration, Nicholas Mitropoulos.
 - iii. In consultation with the Chair of the Town Lands Committee, he felt that the committee would have sold the lot at auction if an abutter were not interested in paying the full amount owed.
 - iv. The Select Board is asked to consider the request of Mr. Mitropoulos to purchase Map 126, Lot 18 for less than the amount owed.
- d. Fire Tanker Cab and Chassis Vote
 - i. The old cab and chassis from the Fire Tank Truck is nearly ready to be returned to Barrington. The trade-in value offered was \$1,500. At the time of bid award, the Select Board agreed to have the cab and chassis returned to Barrington for further evaluation prior to retention or disposal.
 - ii. The Road Agent estimates the value of the cab and chassis to the Town of Barrington at approximately \$10,000 (please note that this may differ from market value). A \$90,000 investment would be necessary in order for this truck to be a valuable asset to the Highway Department. As an immaculate truck with more traditional mechanical components, this approach is certainly an option. If retained and invested in, this truck would replace the next oldest six-wheeled dump truck and would be expected to last 10-12 years versus 15 years for a brand-new truck.



- iii. If through bid or auction, this truck would attract more than \$10,000, the Road Agent would recommend selling it. If the Select Board was interested in offering this truck for sale, we could pursue a sealed-bid process or add it to the auction later this year. A \$10,000 minimum could be set for either option.
- iv. The Select Board is asked to consider offering the Fire Tank Truck cab and chassis for sale through sealed bid/auction with a \$10,000 minimum or to retain it for future Highway Department use.

6. New Business

- a. Cemetery Accounts Payable/Receivable Management Discussion
 - i. The Cemetery Trustees are interested in processing payments to the grave service subcontractor instead of having families working directly with the vendor. This change would allow the Trustees to manage the process in a more professional manner.
 - ii. Practically, this would mean that Town staff would process invoices/payments for grave services in addition to the right to burial process. Currently, there are approximately 12-15 burials per year.
 - iii. There are a few financial mechanisms which could be used to accomplish the stated goal. That decision would be made at a future meeting. The Chair of the Trustees wanted to understand if the Select Board was open to considering this adjustment. If the Select Board is willing to consider, the Chair of the Trustees will hold a Cemetery Trustees meeting to make a formal recommendation.

b. FEMA Hazard Mitigation Opportunities – Engineering Consultant – Vote

- i. Staff are working on two infrastructure projects which may be eligible for supplemental funding from the FEMA Hazard Mitigation program. This is the same funding source used for the Young Road culvert.
- ii. First, are the culverts on Pond Hill and Daniel Cater Roads. We will not pursue funding for this project in 2020 but hope to apply for funding in 2021.
- iii. Second is the culvert replacement on Lakeside Oaks Drive. It is possible to submit an application for this year's funding. We met with representatives form the program to discuss the feasibility and timeline. In order to apply, we would need to engage an engineering consultant to develop the costbenefit analysis prior to the application deadline at the end of November. The cost of the Young Road culvert application cost-benefit analysis was approximately \$5,000. If funding is awarded, that expense is reimbursable. The cost for engineering could be spent from the existing operating budget or the Bridge and Culvert Capital Reserve Account.
- iv. The Board is currently evaluating how to proceed with the culverts on Lakeside Oaks Drive. This funding opportunity may allow the Town to



- proceed with the infrastructure improvements while minimizing the impact to taxpayers.
- v. The Select Board is asked to consider engaging an engineer to finalize the application for FEMA Hazard Mitigation funding on the Lakeside Oaks Drive culvert replacement project.
- c. Request to Purchase Map 234, Lot 1, Sublot 6 Vote
 - i. A commercial real estate agent recently inquired about a Town-owned lot at the end of Redemption Road on behalf of a client. Map 234, Lot 1, Sublot 6 was created by the TURBOCAM Development Agreement which subdivided the property and created Redemption Road. Sublot 6 has previously been earmarked for future Town use with specific thought given to recreational opportunities. The Select Board would have the authority to sell the lot pursuant to RSA 41:14-a.
 - ii. TURBOCAM currently owns three of the original lots and has the right of first refusal to purchase two others (not including sublot 6).
 - iii. The agent explained that the interested party would be an active user with a similar use as TURBOCAM. They would construct a 25K-35K sq. ft. facility. They are looking to be in the seacoast, but Rochester/Barrington is their preference. They are willing to pay market value.

 - i. In late August, Michael Flaherty of 302 Smoke Street wrote to the Town requesting to purchase a portion of Town-owned property which abuts his lot.

 - ii. I shared Mr. Flaherty's request with the Planning Board, Town Lands Committee, and Conservation Commission for review and recommendation to the Select Board. Please find their feedback below:
 - iii. Planning Board (October 6, 2020)
 - 1. The Board had a brief discussion about the resident's request and the Board did not support the request.
 - 2. A motion was made by J. Jennison and seconded by S. Diamond to send a memo to the Select Board that they do not support this request. Vote 5/0.
 - iv. Town Lands Committee (September 12, 2020)
 - 1. 302 Smoke Street, Adjacent to BYA fields. Owner encroaching on Town property, Owner wants to install an inground pool, offered Town \$2,000 for 1 ac. Recommend to not accept low offer. Town

may not want to set a precedent in selling land to parties with special interests. Recommend that the Town may want to contact a lawyer to determine any long-term implications.

- v. Conservation Commission (September 17, 2020)
 - 1. Michael Flaherty (302 Smoke Street) would like to purchase one acre of land from the town to extend his side property line set back so that an in-ground pool could be installed behind his house. Doug questioned if there are wetlands on the acre and if there would be a delineation of wetlands and buffer. John suggested a site visit to look at the property, and Doug and John will do a site walk after scheduling a time with Mr. Flaherty. This request of sale can be revisited at the next CC meeting. Dan mentioned that the Lands Committee had reviewed this request and it feels that the \$2,000 amount Mr. Flaherty had offered for the acre was too low an amount.
- vi. The Select Board is asked to consider the request by the Flaherty family to purchase one acre from Map 224, Lot 10.
